Appendix E | Social Media Analysis

To conduct this analysis, SPR used R statistical software to connect to the Twitter Application Programming Interface (API) to download a historical record of tweets. Specifically, SPR used the R packages "twitteR" and "rtweet" to access the REST API, which allows users to gather pointing time collections of tweets and user information.

Description of the Twitter Universe

The complete list of handles in the universe can be found in Appendix A-2. Overall, the universe contained 345 handles. These handles were determined as follows.

- (1) **Census Partners (59):** SPR created this list based on the organizations, news outlets, and Census-affiliated offices that were connected to the initiative.
- (2) Statewide Funders (31): This group was derived from the list of funders included in the following groups: 1) Statewide Funders' Initiative, 2) Regional Pooled Fund Holder; and/or 3) Community Foundations who also serve as an ACBO. In some cases, an organization's handle and a key individual's handle within the organization were both included in the list.
- (3) **Grantees (253):** This list represents the organizations funded by the initiative that met the following criteria: (1) had a Twitter handle; and (2) have 300 or more followers or tweet on average more than once per week.

Twitter Data Analysis

To assess the movement at baseline, SPR pulled the list of followers for each handle in this universe on March 3, 2020. Additionally, SPR pulled the last 200 tweets from every handle in this universe on the following dates: (1) March 24, 2020; (2) June 3, 2020; (3) August 17, 2020; (4) October 6, 2020; and (5) April 21, 2021. Lastly, SPR pulled the list of followers foreach handle in the universe on April 21, 2021. These datasets were used to conduct the following analyses:

(1) **The Twitter network at baseline:** The list of followers from the March 3, 2020 dataset allowed us to visualize and analyze Twitter connections within the universe of census handles to understand the Twitter network composition before the census launched.

- (2) **Pre-Census retweet analysis:** Using the March 24, 2020 dataset, SPR analyzed who in the Census universe was retweeting one another, how much this retweeting occurred, and the content of those retweets.
- (3) Census content analysis: The three datasets pulled during the summer and fall were exported into an Excel spreadsheet for manual coding of content. Overlapping dates were removed from the dataset and tweets without census content were removed from the dataset. Each tweet was then coded as relating to one or more hard-to-count (HTC) populations, 2020 intersecting events (e.g., COVID-19 and Get Out the Vote), key strategies or events, and general census information. Furthermore, coders included notes on key themes arising from tweets' intersections with key 2020 events.
- (4) Hashtag and campaign analysis: The three datasets pulled during the summer and fall were merged and analyzed for frequency of key hashtags, census campaign success, and frequencies of favorites and retweets. It is important to note that these census campaigns extended beyond the Twitter universe used for this analysis. Therefore, the counts described in the main report do not capture all the tweets associated with the campaigns. However, our analysis points to the extent to which census campaigns were utilized as an outreach strategy among the handles in this Twitter universe.⁴
- (5) The Twitter network post-census enumeration: The list of followers from the April 21, 2021 dataset allowed us to visualize and analyze Twitter connections within the universe of census handles to understand the Twitter network composition post-census enumeration and compare this network with the baseline network.
- (6) **Post-census enumeration retweet analysis:** Using the April 21, 2021 dataset, SPR analyzed who in the Census universe was retweeting one another, how much this retweeting occurred, and the content of those retweets. The findings from the post-census enumeration analysis were compared with the pre-census retweet findings.
