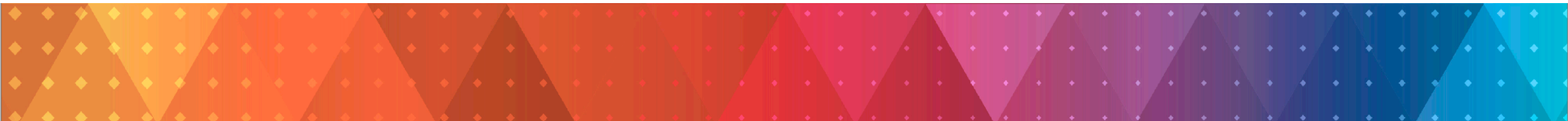

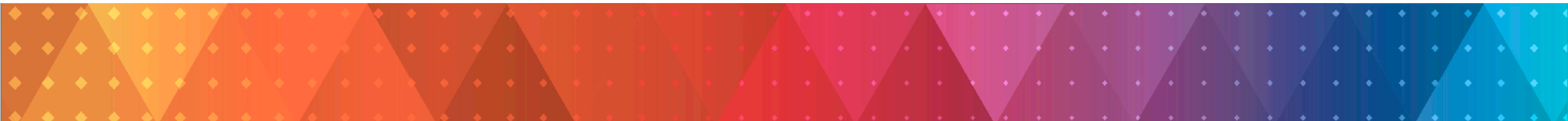


Total Funding

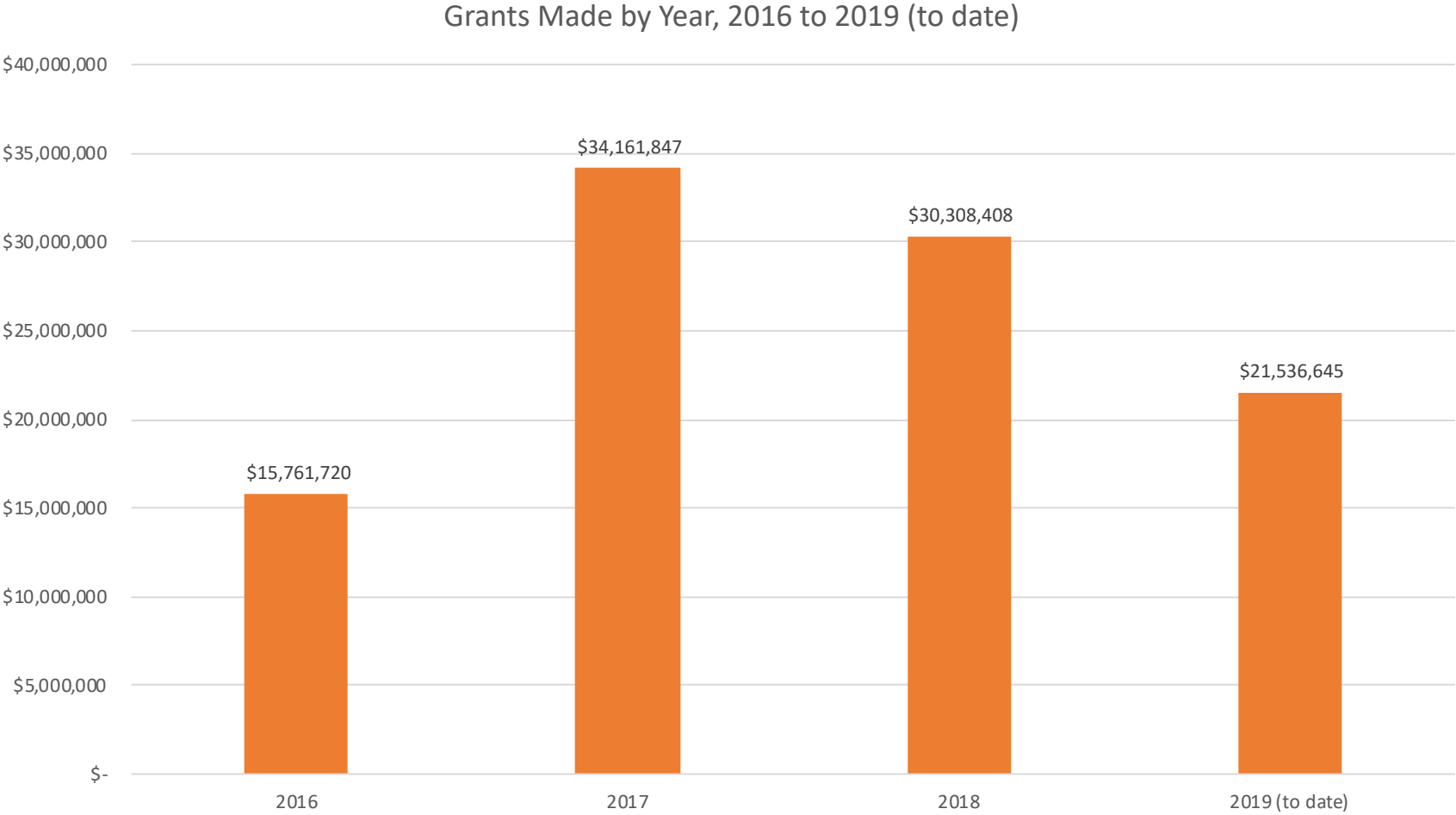


Immigrant-related funding more than doubled from 2016 to 2017 and 2018.

Grants Made by Year

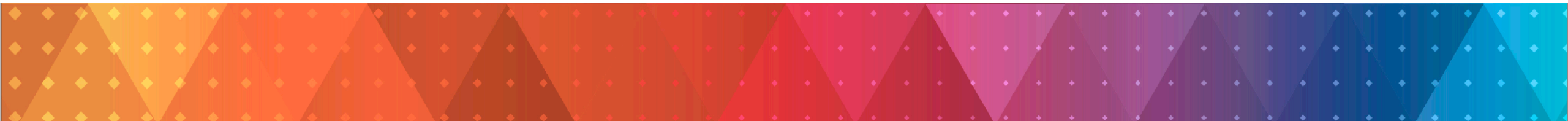




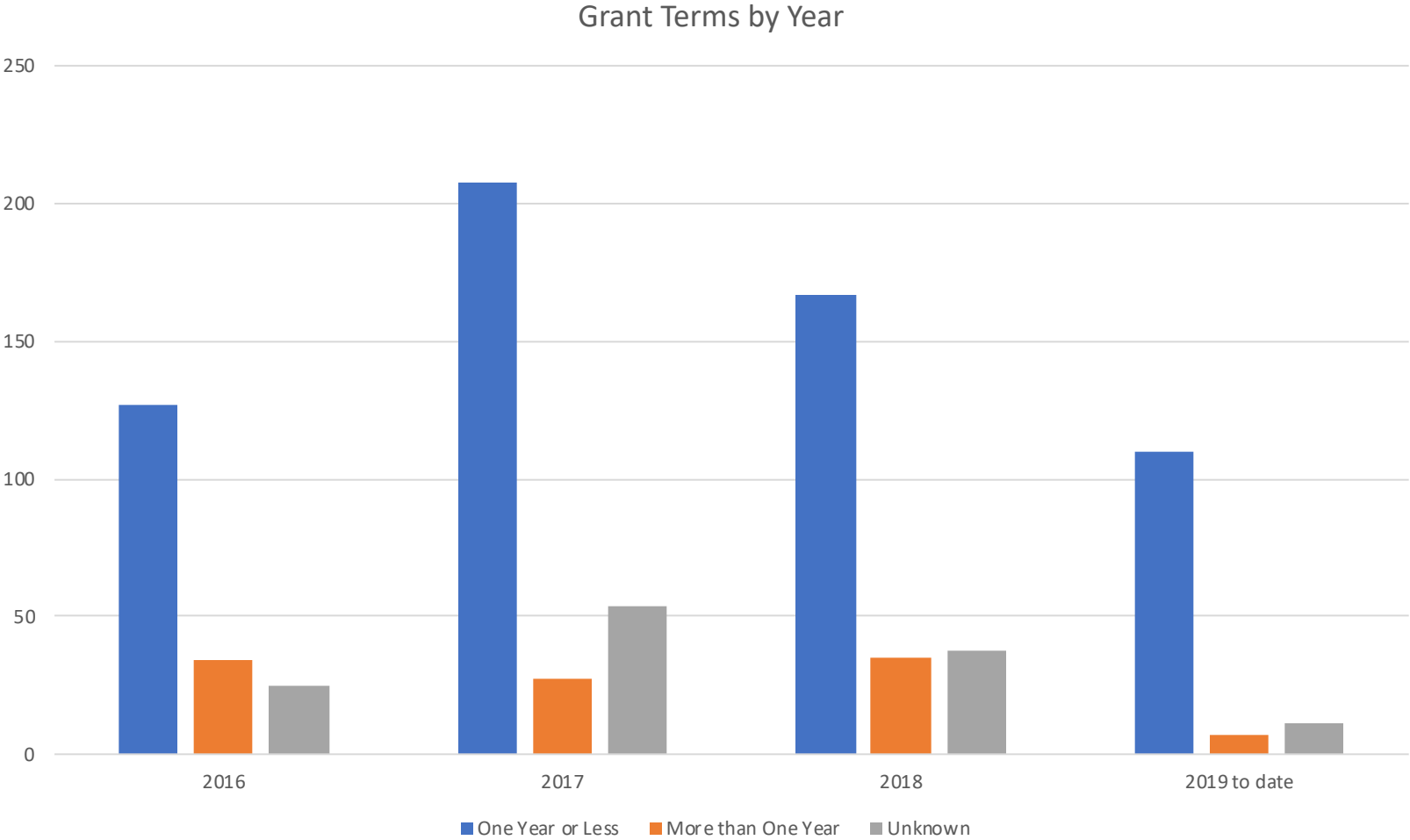
Grant Terms

Grants Terms by Year

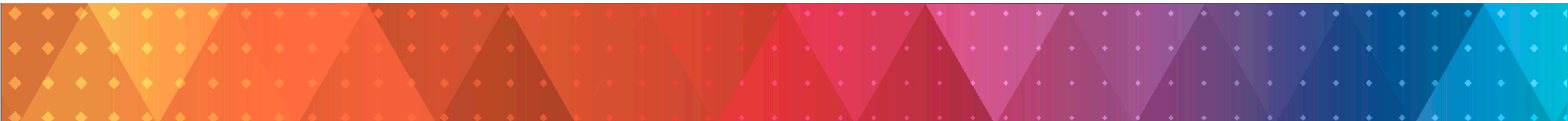




Type of Support

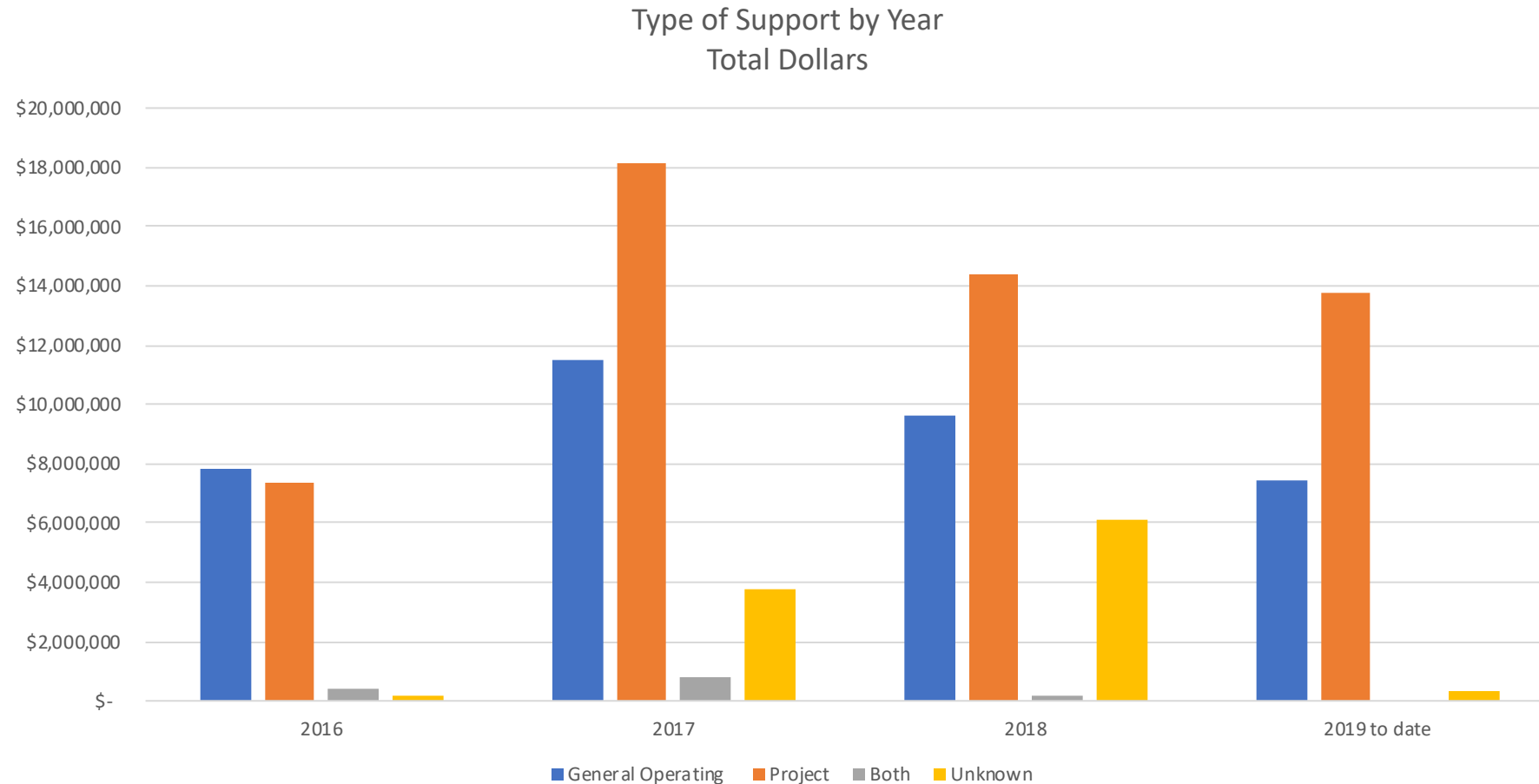


Total funding for projects far exceeds total funding for general support.





Type of Support by Year, Total Dollars

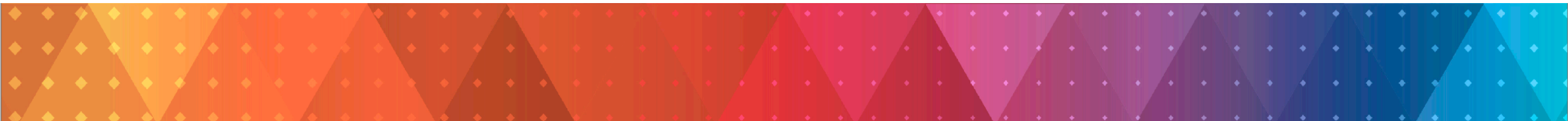




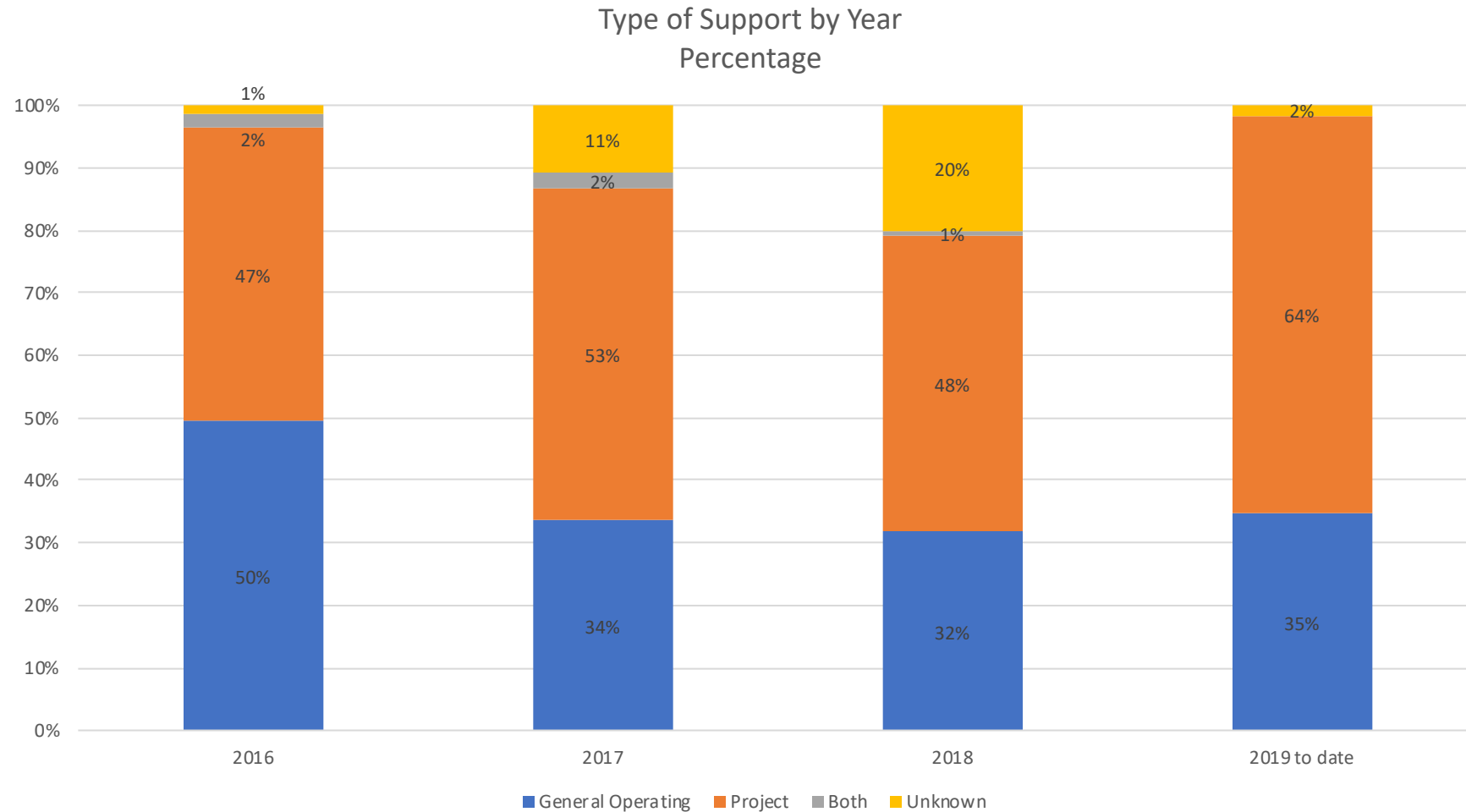
Type of Support by Year, Percentage



General-support funding decreased from 50% of total immigrant-related funding in 2016 to only 35% of total funding this year, although total dollars remain essentially level.



Type of Support by Year

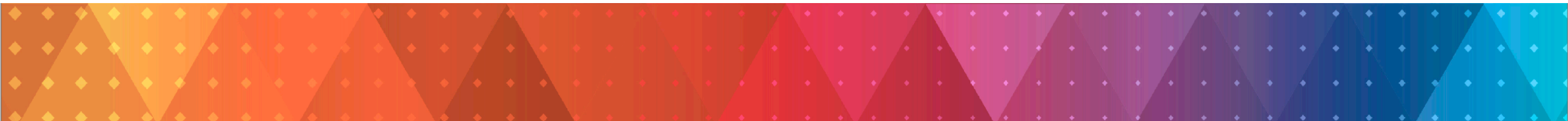




Grants by Issue Area

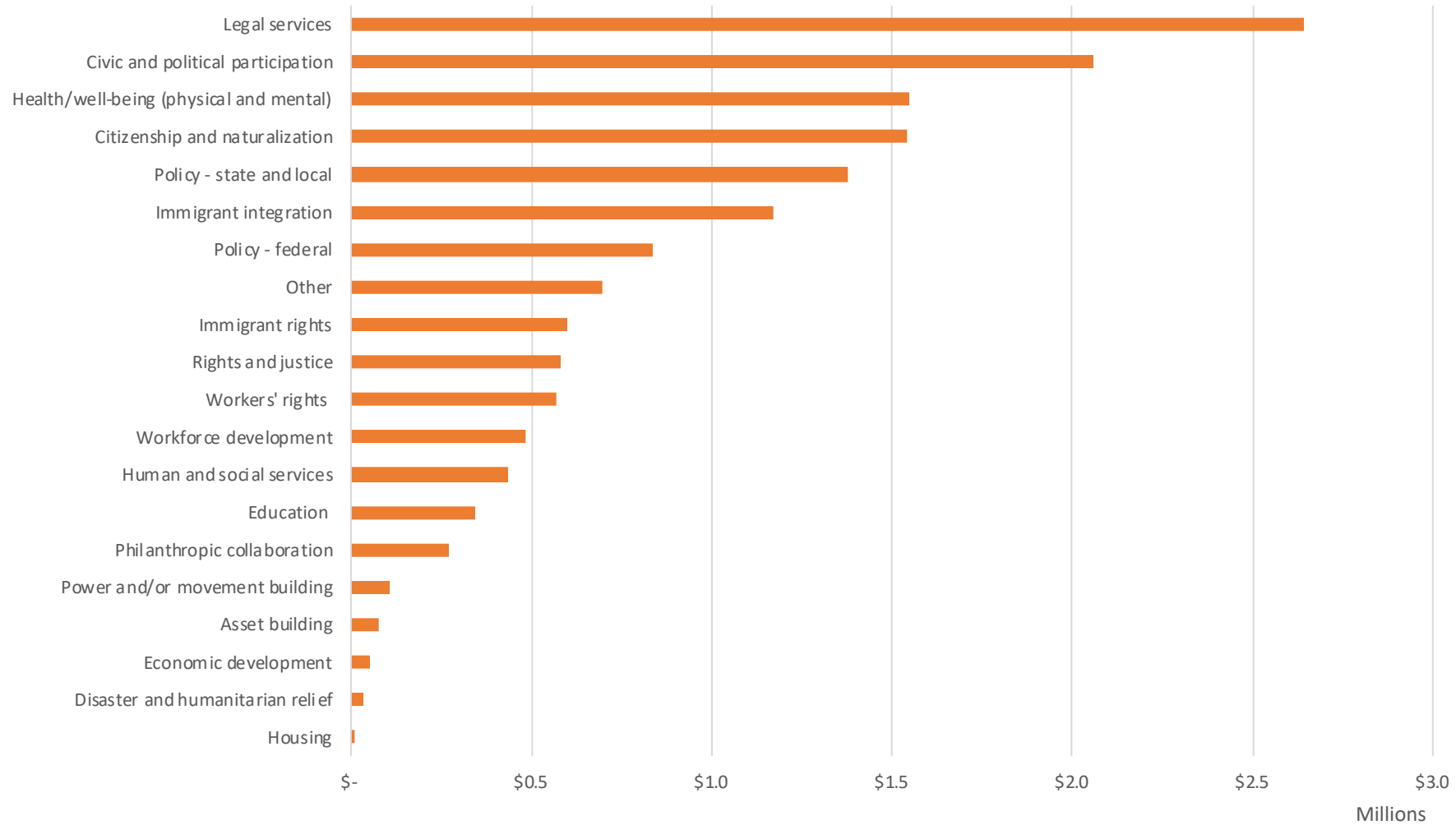


- Legal services consistently secured the most funding between 2016 and present, with the largest share and total in 2017 in the first full year of rapid response.
- Civic/political participation, health, and citizenship/naturalization received a large share of funding in 2016, but these areas saw a decrease in share of funding in subsequent years.
- Census funding began in earnest in 2018 and took the largest share of funding in 2019.



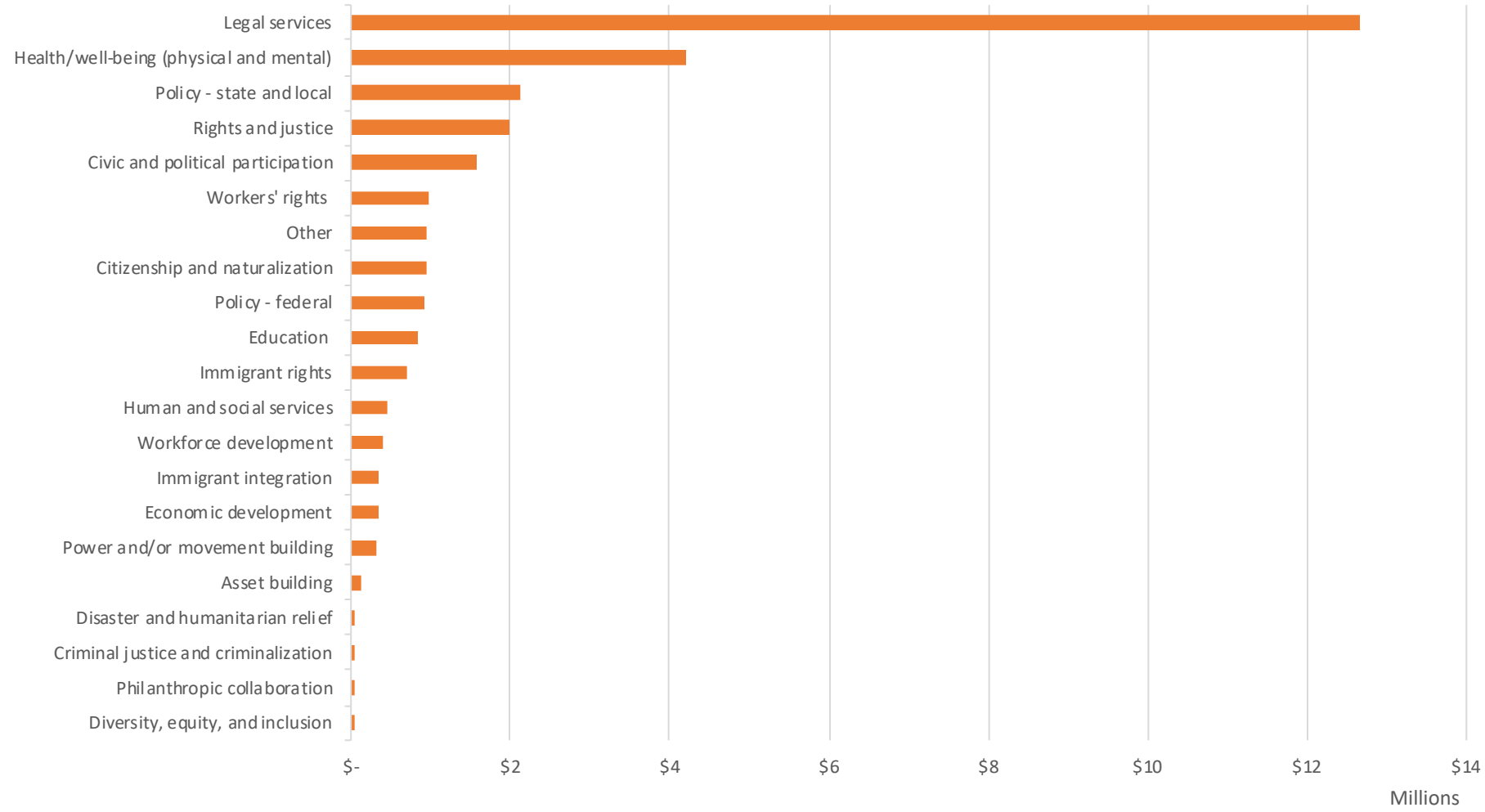


2016 Grants by Issue Area



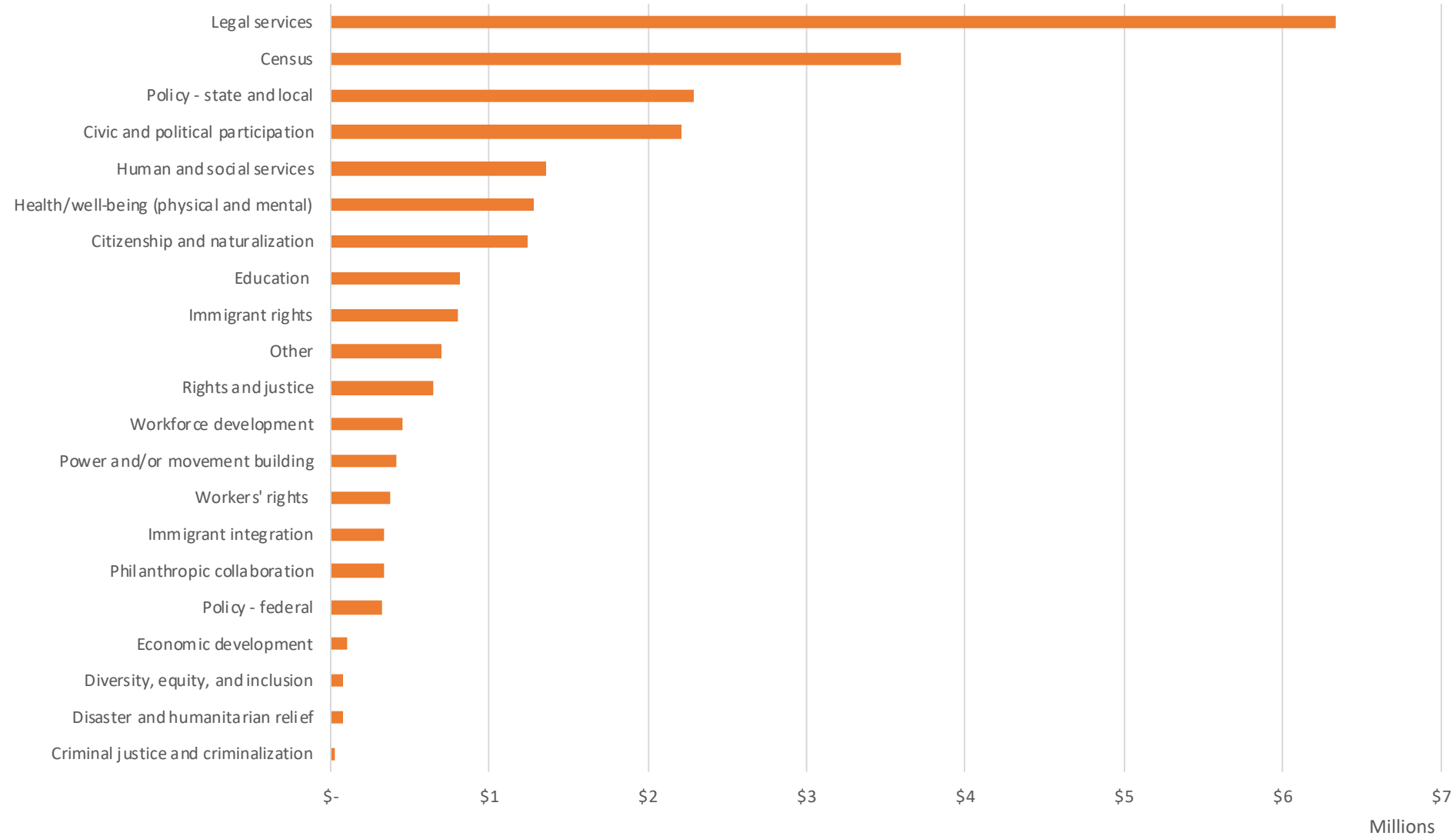


2017 Grants by Issue Area



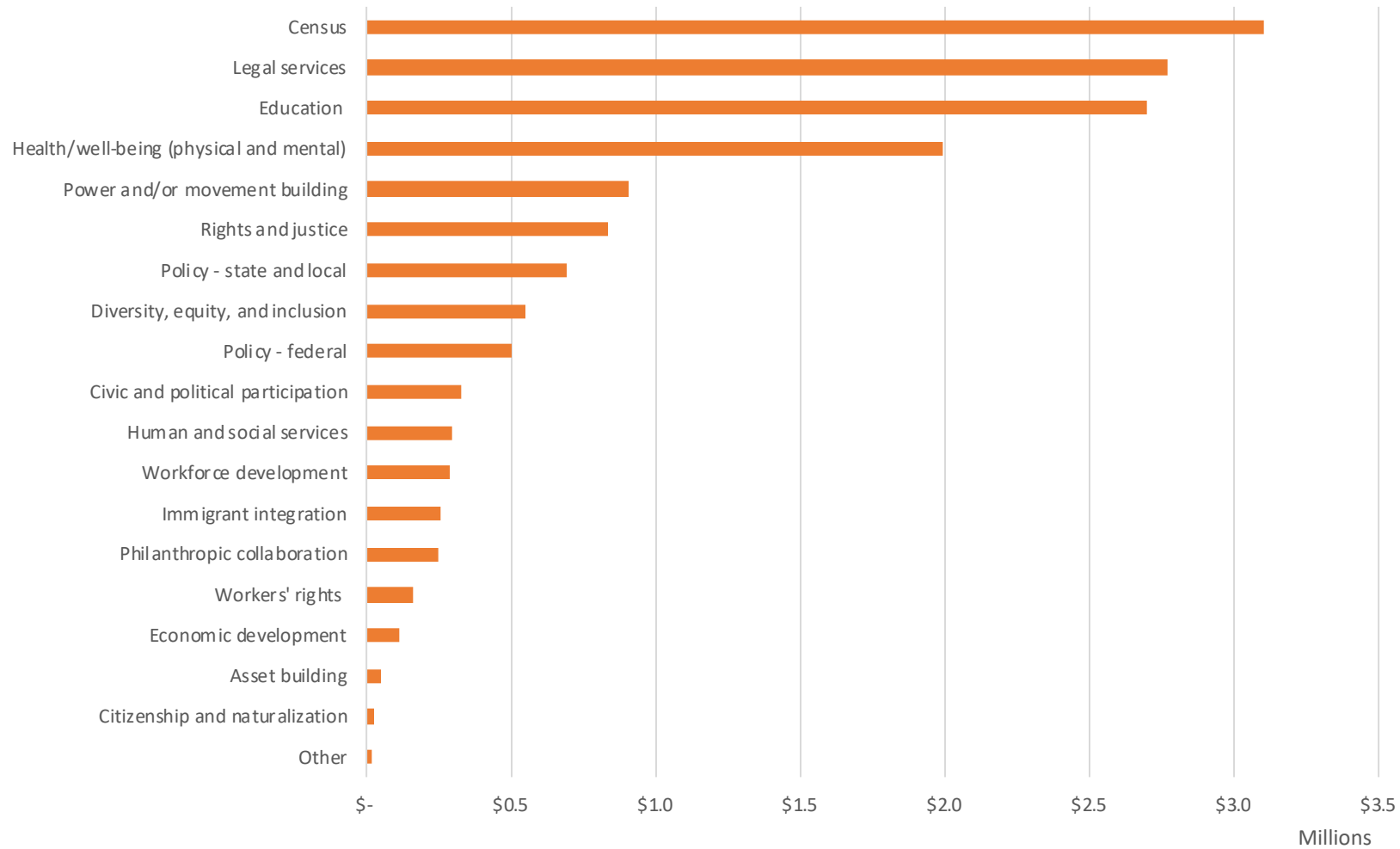


2018 Grants by Issue Area





2019 (to date) Grants by Issue Area

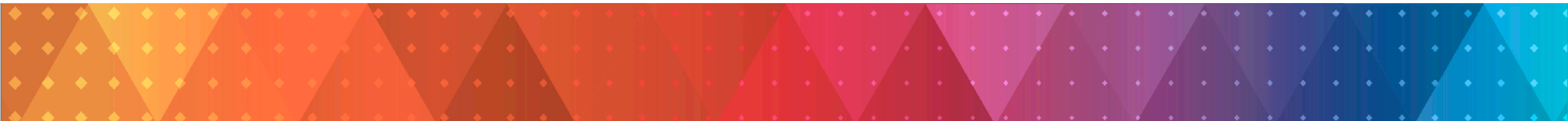




Funding By Strategy



Capacity building, community outreach and education, and policy advocacy consistently secured the most funding between 2016 and present.



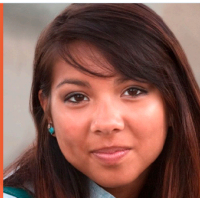

**Embrace the humanity and dignity
of all people.**





JUSTICE



**Ensure fairness, equity, and justice
for all.**



Equality



The assumption is that **everyone benefits from the same supports**. This is equal treatment.

Equity



Everyone gets the supports they need (this is the concept of "affirmative action"), thus producing equity.

Justice



All 3 can see the game without supports or accommodations because **the cause(s) of the inequity was addressed**. The systemic barrier has been removed.



OPPORTUNITY



Provide opportunity for all to thrive.



COMMUNITY



Create the mindset of “we” — and strong, cohesive communities in which all members value their interdependence and feel they belong.





DEMOCRACY



**Recognize that a vibrant and pluralistic
democracy as fundamental.**

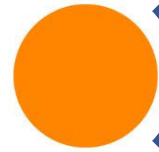




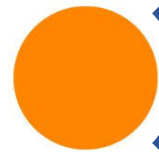
Make immigrant-focused grants and grants at the nexus of immigration and other funding priorities



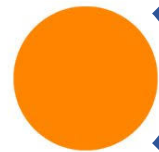
Increase payout and divest from companies that undermine grantmaking goals
