



MICHIGAN: A BORDER STATE


U.S. border patrol considers all of Michigan to be within 100 miles of an international border, meaning that border patrol agents can carry out warrantless searches anywhere in the state.17



Over 30% of people processed by border patrol are U.S. citizens, and another 10% are foreign citizens lawfully in the country.



Over 63% of people detained over a two vear period were first stopped by another agency, like local police.




The number of border patrol agents in the Detroit grew from 38 to 411 between 2001 and 2015. an increase of 981%. by far the fastest rate of growth of any sector.¹⁸


